






Now, let's try subtracting. Here again are some standard subtraction facts we know.

$$1-1=0$$
 makes sense  $\Rightarrow 1-1=0$   $V$   
 $1-0=1$   $Since$   $\Rightarrow 1-0=1$   $V$   
the equivalent  $\Rightarrow 2-1=1$   $V$
